Introduce Storytelling in your School's Curriculum

Word is spreading about the relevance of storytelling in schools and the number of storytellers in schools is growing worldwide.

Storytelling provides those all-important points of entry

As a learning tool, storytelling encourages students to explore their unique expressiveness and heighten a student's ability to communicate thoughts and feelings in an articulate, lucid manner.

Multi-sensory Development in the Storytelling Classroom

Through telling stories students gain presentation skills, knowledge of their subject, and learn through teaching and sharing with others.

Storytelling for Special Needs Children

Storytelling is also a fabulous tool to develop the listening and concentration of late developers or children with special needs; as well as to engage and draw their attention in a way that is enjoyable and less stressful for them. Storytelling also encourages language and reading development and can be integrated into a variety of curriculum areas.

Dr. Margaret Read MacDonald has written over 60 books on folklore and storytelling topics. Her Ph.D. in Folklore has helped her tackle the task of adapting folktales for use in the classroom. This year Margaret offered performances and workshops for schools in Tanzania, Bahrain, Oman, Germany, Madrid, Switzerland, Taiwan and China. She is loved for her lively audience-participation folktales which engage listeners immediately, and for her easy-to-tell tales which make her workshops a joyful success. She is author of nineteen award winning folktale picture books, and recently published a new tale collection, *The Singing Top: Folktales of Malaysia, Singapore, and Brunei*

Donna Jacobs Sife is a singer, storyteller, educator and published writer, who uses her talents to enlighten and enhance tolerance and understanding within the people she touches. From the United Nations to Woodford Folk Festival, her considerable international reputation is built on her capacity to bridge difference. For nearly two decades she has travelled widely throughout the world teaching and telling stories. She has been interviewed a number of times on ABC Radio on The Spirit of Things and Encounter. In addition to performing and teaching, Donna is a lecturer at the University of Sydney and the University of New South Wales in Sacred Story.



WORKSHOPS

Creative Writing

Mixture of storytelling, drama and experiential writing workshop that explores description, the authentic voice, character, points of view, structure, and style. An excellent way to begin an intensive creative writing module.

Beyond Difference

Beyond Difference Stories that explore different ways to resolve conflict, and address prejudice, fear and mistrust. Drawing from a range of traditional stories from multicultures, this program goes directly to the heart of concerns that are having such a grave effect on the world today. Although lighthearted and humourous, the ancient wisdom held in these stories can do much to alert us to our own intolerance, and encourage new ways to respond.

Adapting Stories for Different Ages

Different ages respond to different styles and narratives. This workshop explores what it is that captures the imagination of children - from preschool to high school, and gives clear and precise instruction on how to adapt a story to suit the age.

Conflict Anger and Understanding Bullying through story

This workshop offers not only skills and techniques as to how to use story in conflict and bullying situations, but also offers a large number of stories to use, and resources where to find more. This workshop draws on Donna's extensive experience with troubled schools and youth detention centers over the past twenty years in Australia, South Africa, New York and Israel.

PERFORMANCES

Me? We!

This performance features a repertoire of story, poetry and song, that spans the world's traditions and folklore. The stories encourage empathy and an appreciation of other cultures. The stories implicitly respond to bullying, prejudice, fear of difference, being part of a community, and conflict resolution.

Murmuring Trees and An Ear to the Ground

We ask: What is it that makes us truly rich?; What is it that gives us happiness?; and What price do we pay when we ignore these things? Themes raised are ecological awareness, environmentalism, sustainability, inner wealth, responsibility to the earth and future generations.

Meeting the Mirror

The stories for this performance develop the idea that our greatest task is to discover and be true to our essential natures, regardless of the views and actions of those around us, and to take responsibility for the things that we do. We take these ideas further into the realm of service and response to injustice.

The Walled Garden

This performance safely and non-didactically gives strategies to deal with abuse, including drug abuse, addictions, family secrets, and friends in crisis. We explore the time it is appropriate to keep a secret and the time to tell. We delve into shame, how it imprisons and alienates, and how we can set ourselves free.
